Progress in delivery of strategic outcomes

Q1 15/16: Quarter 1 reporting for Education focuses on Improving Attendance, Positive Destinations and pupil progress in primary school performance using standardised assessment data (P1 and P7)

Positive Destinations

The percentage of young people in Midlothian leaving school and going on to a positive destination has improved by 0.8% on the same period last year. The figures, collated by the national skills body, Skills Development Scotland, show that 90% of school leavers in Midlothian have found a job, enrolled in university/college, training or secured another positive destination such as volunteering. This compares with 89.2% at the same time last year. While the year-on-year figure continues to improve the council recognises the importance of helping young people sustain a long term destination. In December 2014 the percentage of Midlothian school leavers in an initial positive destination was 93.9% but as is traditionally the case, this number reduces in the summer term and the June sustained destinations figure was 90%. Education has implemented a robust approach to supporting young people to help them secure and sustain a positive destination and we have re-directed resources accordingly to ensure that this continues to be a key priority for improvement.

We have also implemented the Developing Scotland's Young Workforce Recommendations through the development of a multi-agency Board who will be responsible for delivering on Developing Midlothian's Young

Attendance

Over the course of session 2014/15, primary school attendance fell by 0.4% and secondary school attendance fell by 1.4%. Improving attendance is a key priority moving forward and attendance statistics will be scrutinised monthly by the Head of Education and School Group Managers. Comparing quarter 1 from 2015/16 with quarter 1 from the previous year there was a fall of 2.14% in secondary school attendance compared with only 0.25% in the primary sector. As a result each secondary school were asked to complete a short return outlining the reasons for the 2.14% decline overall in order to enable the design of key interventions to improve attendance across the secondary school sector. The Head of Education and Head of Children's Services are working together in order to ensure that there is a coherent and consistent approach to improving attendance.

Pupil progress in primary school performance using standardised assessment data

End of P1: There was a 0.64 improvement in Maths at the end of P1 due to the successful implementation of SEAL (Stages of Early Arithmetic Learning) -an ambitious target has been set for 52.2. There was a 0.33% decrease in Reading at the end of P1. An ambitious target has been set at 52.1 for 2015/16. End of P7: There was a 0.4 improvement in the number of P7 pupils leaving primary school with a reading age of 9.5 years+. An improvement target of 89.3 has been set for 2015/16. There was an improvement of 1.5 in Maths by the end of P7 and an ambitious target of 95.3 has been set for 2015/16.

Emerging Challenges and Risks

Q1 15/16:

Improving positive destinations and attendance are two key priorities moving forward. Implementing our commitment to *achieving better than our previous best*, three ambitious targets have been set in order to ensure continuous improvement: 95% positive destinations; 95.5% primary school attendance and 93% secondary school attendance.

Ensuring that Midlothian Council meets Scottish Governments Commitment to maintaining teacher numbers and ratios in our schools.

Teacher recruitment within Scotland is proving problematic and Education and HR staff within Midlothian have worked hard to recruit classroom and subject teachers for the coming academic year. We have also recruited permanent supply staff. However, this will remain a challenge in the coming year.

Reporting on Positive Destinations will be changing from August 2015 to include participation measures for 16 – 19 year olds. We have been advised that this will have an impact on our positive destination returns as it will be a longitudinal overview rather than two snapshots per year. We will monitor this closely during course of year.

Education Bill – an up-date report was presented to August Council outlining the implications for Midlothian. – this will be closely monitored during course of year.

Implementation of Named Person – We are working closely with our Schools/Health Partners/Scottish Government and SEEMIS/IT providers to ensure that we are well placed for implementation in August 2016.
