The Midlothian Roll of Honour commemorates the men and women of Midlothian who gave their lives in the First World War 1914-1918.


It records details of every casualty on First World War memorials in the Midlothian area.



Obituary: Lewis Alexander Affleck - Scots Guards

[Dalkeith Advertiser 17 December 1914]: Lewis A. Affleck, a private in the 1st Scots Guards, has been killed in action at Ypres on 12th November. Private Affleck, who resided with his father, Mr George Affleck, West End Cottages, Loanhead, enlisted at the outbreak of the war. He is the first Loanhead man reported killed in action. He was formerly a miner.

Tom Allan came from a military family whose maternal grandfather fought at the battle of Waterloo in 1815. His father George was a veteran of the Scots Guards. William was a miner at Smeaton colliery. He enlisted in 5th Dragoon Guards in August 1914 and was transferred to the Highland Light Infantry in June 1915. He fought at the battle of Loos in September 1915 and was killed in Mesopotamia. William's brother Tom also died in the war and a third brother Robert was severely wounded. Their parents, George and Mary Allan, received the news of William's death by the morning post and a few hours later a telegram arrived confirming Tom's death.

Obituary: Thomas Richardson Allan - Scots Guards

[DALKEITH ADVERTISER 8 February 1917]: Mr and Mrs George Allan, 52 High Street, Dalkeith, received the melancholy intelligence on Saturday that two of their soldier sons had made the supreme sacrifice in the great war. The mornings's post brought an official document from Hamilton, informing them that their second son, Private William Allan, of the H.L.I., had been killed in action in the fighting at the Persian Gulf. In the opening days of the war, August 1914, William responded to the country's call by enlisting in the 5th Dragoon Guards, with which regiment he spent several months in France, passing unscathed through the battle of Loos and other engagements. In June, 1915, he was transferred to the Highland Light Infantry, and had served for thirteen months with that regiment in Mesopotamia, when he met his death. He was 25 years of age, and in civil life was employed as a miner at Smeaton Colliery. Mr and Mrs Allan had not recovered from the first shock caused by the ews of Williams' death, when on Saturday evening a telegram came from London announcing that their third son, Private Tom Allan, of the Machine Gun Section, Scots Guards, had died in hospital at Rouen on 2nd inst., from the effects of gun shot wounds to the face and legs received in action on the 15th January. The deceased, who enlisted in July 1915, had been in France since June of last year. He was 21 years of age and, like his brother, was formerly employed in the mines at Smeaton. Deep sympathy is being expressed towards Mr and Mrs Allan in the loss of their two stalwart sons. To their grief at the present time is added anxiety for the safety of their eldest son, Private Robert Allan, of the Scots Guards, who was rather severely wounded about six months ago, and is now in hospital at Rouen suffering from rheumatic fever. Enlisting in November 1915, he had been on active service in France since July of last year. The Allan family have a long military pedigree. Mr George Allan is himself a Scots Guards veteran, having taken part in the famous



[MIDLOTHIAN JOURNAL 22 January 1915]: Armour was the youngest son of James Armour, the champion quoiter of thirty years ago, and was 29 years of age. He was a Reservist, and when war broke out was working at Whitehill Colliery, Rosewell.

He was a territorial soldier and rejoined the Scots Guards at the beginning of the war. He was wounded but returned to the fighting. He was reported missing in October 1914 but his death was only confirmed in April 1916. He was involved in education work in the Army. His brother JD Breslin was a schoolteacher at Roslin and was badly wounded in the war.

Obituary: Frank Breslin - Scots Guards

[Midlothian Journal 7 April 1916]: Intimation has now been made that Lance Sergeant Francis H. Breslin, formerly reported missing, has officially been posted as killed. Sergeant Breslin, who was the younger son of Mr John D. Breslin, Bridge Street [Penicuik], was a reservist of the Scots Guards and rejoined his regiment at the outbreak of the war. He was wounded in the early stages of the fighting, but appears to have rejoined his battalion shortly afterwards. The deceased, who was engaged in insurance work previous to the war, was, prior to enlisting, a clerk in the employment of the Co-operative Society, and while in the army was engaged in school work. His brother, who was schoolmaster at Roslin, holds a commission in the army.

Obituary : Joseph Brown - Scots Guards

[Midlothian Journal 16 June 1916]: Mrs Brown, Oakleaf, has now received official notification that her husband - Private Joseph Brown, 2nd Scots Guards - was killed on 28th October, 1914. The deceased, who belonged to Howgate, was formerly in the 3rd Battalion Scots Guards, and when called up as a reservist was residing in Peebles, where he was employed. For a number of years he was employed in Eskmills, where he was highly esteemed. He was a member of the Thistle Lodge of Free Gardeners, and is the fourth member of the lodge to make the supreme sacrifice. He was posted missing in the early stages of the war, and enquiries made in every possible direction failed to get any definite information. [The Book of Remembrance for Tweeddale: Burgh and parish of Peebles: Book One]: Private Joseph Brown, of the Second Battalion Scots Guards, was one of the "Old Contemptibles." He had been a motor vanman in Peebles; and later was employed, as a chauffeur, at Ellerslie Garage by Mr James Thomson. Being a Reservist, he was called up in August 1914. The last word that came from him in France was upon the 8th October 1914; thereafter he was posted as "Missing." Later, intimation from the Army Council arrived, stating that he had fallen on the 28th October. He left a widow and a little girl.

Obituary: William Clark - Scots Guards

[Dalkeith Advertiser 26 November 1914]: Official intimation has this week been received by Mrs Clark, 28 St Davids, that her husband, William Clark, who had been severely wounded while fighting at the front and was lying in a critical condition in hospital, had succumbed to his wounds. Although a number of local men have been wounded at the front, this is the first deep, dark shadow of the war that has fallen on Newtongrange. Much sympathy is felt and expressed for Mrs Clark, and what has made it more pathetically sad is the loss of her baby boy, after a few hours illness from an attack of acute pneumonia only the three days after the confirmation of her husband's death.





[The Scotsman 3 October 1918]: Captain Henry L. N. Dundas MC, Scots Guards, whose death (killed in action) is reported as having taken place on 27th September, was the only son of Mr and Mrs Nevill Dundas, Redhall, Slateford, Midlothian. He was educated at Horris Hill and at Eton College, where he was an Oppidan Scholar and captain of the Oppidans in the summer half of 1915. He obtained an Open Scholarship in History at Christ Church, Oxford, in June 1915, but was never in residence there, as he received a commission in the Scots Guards in the August following. After acting as an instructor in the Guards Brigade Bombing School at Southfields during part of the winter 1915-16, he went to the front in May 1916, and with the exception of a short interval at brigade headquarters, was with his battalion from that time till the date of his death. He was placed in command of a company at the age of twenty and a half and was awarded the Military cross for his success in leading it into action at Passchendaele on 9th Oct 1917. He was wounded on 17th may last, and received a bar to his Military Cross under circumstances detailed in a recent Gazette, and he returned to the front on 23rd July. He fell in one of the actions before Cambrai in which the Guards are reported to have been engaged. His Colonel, writing to his father, says: 'Henry was the life and soul of the battalion, and was loved by us all. As a soldier he was magnificent, so wonderfully capable, gallant, and cheerful. He was adored by his company, who would have followed him anywhere. I know that it is the death he would have chosen. He was commanding his company, of which he was so proud and fond, in an entirely successful attack at the time.' His soldier servant also writes: 'He was liked by everyone as a thorough sportsman, and as a leader of men he was hard to beat.'

He took part in a few of the battles about Ypres, where he was wounded and his feet were frostbitten. He was invalided home with a strained heart early in 1915, and was only partially recovered when he was again sent to France, where he broke down and was in hospital for six months, being discharged as medically unfit on 9th June 1916. He was rather fond of relating that he was one of a few Guardsmen who met the Germans between the trenches on Christmas day 1914, and exchanged friendly greetings.

Obituary: Ernest Taylor Franklin - Seaforth Highlanders

[Midlothian Journal 29 October 1915]: On Tuesday Mrs A. Franklin, Croft Street, received the sad intelligence that her youngest son, Private Ernest Franklin, 7th Seaforth Highlanders, had been killed in France on 25th September at the Battle of Loos. His pocket book was found on the battlefield and forwarded to his brother-in-law. Private Cain, of the Royal Scots, who sent it home in the belief that good news would reach those at home about the lad. Private Franklin, who was previously employed with ex-Provost Wilson, was one of a group of lads who enlisted from the town in the spring of the year, and he was for a number of years connected with the Boy Scouts. Another brother is in the same regiment. Much sympathy is felt for his bereaved mother. [St James the Less Episcopal Church Magazine November 1915]: Since our last issue intimation was received that Ernest Franklin was killed in action on 25th of September. His death is deeply felt by all who knew him, for they could not fail to be attracted to the depth of his personal character. Words fail to express how much he will be missed our Church life. He was great example of loyalty and faithfulness. From boy-hood a member of the choir, cross-bearer and server. A regular Communicant, he was one of those who find their strength obeying their Lord's command. He was a keen member of the Church Men's Society. Ten days before he was killed we received a letter from him in which he regretted having had no opportunity to make his Communion for some time. On the following Sunday a Chaplain was present, and he was able to communicate on the battlefield. This was to be his last Communion. Before the next Sunday dawned he was at rest. He lived well and died nobly.

James Fraser, Dalkeith. The deceased officer, who was 34 years of age, enlisted in June 1916, and obtained his commission a month later. After only three weeks at the front he was seriously injured on 22 August, but had been making a fair recovery till about a fortnight ago, when he had a relapse and passed away on Thursday last. Lieutenant Fraser was apprenticed to the law firm of Miller, Robson &McEwan, Edinburgh, and was afterwards engaged in the offices of Messrs W. &J. L. Officer, WS, and latterly practised on his own behalf. Then he joined the firm of solicitors in Paisley of Messrs J. Caldwell &Co., his uncle, the founder of that business, being the late Mr James Caldwell, County Clerk of Renfrewshire. Mr Fraser was, since its formation in 1896, an official of the Dalkeith and Newbattle Golf Club, and for a term was captain of the club. Reference was made to the death of Lieutenant Fraser at the service in Buccleuch Street U.F. Church on Sabbath last, and the Death March in 'Saul' was played on the organ.



Obituary: Thomas Gray - Seaforth Highlanders

[Dalkeith Advertiser 27 May 1915]: Official word was received by Mr and Mrs James Gray, 5 Watson Lane, on Saturday that their son Thomas Gray, a private in the 2nd Seaforth Highlanders, had succumbed in one of the base hospitals on 6 May to the effects of gas poisoning. Gray was one of the defenders of Hill 60 when the Germans, finding legitimate means futile, resorted to the use of asphyxiating gas with a view to dislodging them from that position. Private J. F. Paterson, one of Gray's comrades-in-arms, in a letter to the deceased's parents says that between the gas poisoning and the machine guns it was almost impossible for anything in the vicinity to live: it was pure murder, and he (Paterson) was one of the very few time serving men left in the battalion. He describes young Gray, who was only 19 years of age, as a fine soldier, who went into everything with a good heart. Another comrade, Private James Thomson, writes telling how much they all feel Private Gray's death. He was a brave little lad knowing no fear, and he was the life of his section both in and out of the trenches. Private Gray enlisted into the 2nd Seaforths about fourteen months ago, prior to which he was employed as a miner at the Lady Victoria Pit. This is the second son of Mr and Mrs Gray who has sacrificed his life in his country's cause during the present war, his elder brother, John, of the HLI, having been killed in action on 4 March last. Another brother, Matthew, is serving at the front with the 1st Battalion HLI, while a fourth, Henry, is with the 3/8th Battalion Royal Scots at Peebles.

Obituary: James Hornsey Montague - Seaforth Highlanders

[Midlothian Journal 9 November 1917]: According to the testimony of an officer given some time ago, Corporal James Hornesy Montague was "one of the bravest young soldiers of the Seaforths," and several of his comrades in arms have repeatedly written home, and also spoken of the daring deeds which he took part in during his two and a half years' service at the front: when from Loos onward he was in the thick of the fighting. His most notable deed of daring was the capture of a German officer and two men with a machine gun, for which he was recommended by his superiors. The officer was wearing the Iron Cross, and the gallant Corporal sent home the ribbon to his Mother with the simple modest note- "I captured a German Machine gun." And now the news has come that the gallant Corporal was killed in action on 4th October. The first intimation Mrs Montague received was a letter from a Birkenhead minister stating that a wounded comrade had secured James' belongings, which were sent on later. Last week the official notice was received from the War Office. Corporal Montague came from a soldier family. His Grandfather a Rifle Brigade Crimean War veteran, was afterwards for 22 years foreman in the Calendar Department of Valleyfield Mills, while two of his uncles served in the Navy, one loosing his life as a result of an accident while at gunnery practice in British Columbia: while the other who took part in the bombardment of Alexandria, joined his old unit after the outbreak of war. The father of the deceased soldier, Private Rob. H. Montague, an old volunteer, rejoined in 1914, and with his eldest son was mobilised with the territorials, shared in the rigours of the first winter in the trenches. Two other sons of Private Montague are serving in the Navy and the youngest in the Royal Scots as a band boy. Corporal Montague, who enlisted when he reached his seventeenth year, was nineteen and half years of age. He was latterly in the



Obituary: Francis Paterson - Seaforth Highlanders

[Dalkeith Advertiser 5 August 1915]: Private Francis Paterson, No. 1342, of B Coy, 1st Seaforth Highlanders, son of Mr Frank Paterson, Wilson's Close West, was, according to information received from the front, killed in action on Sunday 25th July. A letter from the regimental chaplain, Rev. J.H.H. McNeill, says he was shot through the head while serving in the trenches. It would comfort his relatives to know that his body was brought back and they were able to bury him in the little military cemetery. They had the funeral there on Monday forenoon, when a few of the Seaforths who were able to get away stood around the grave, and at the last smoothed out his resting place. It was, the chaplain added, with deep sorrow that he wrote to tell the news. It was hard to lose the soldiers who had fought so fine a fight and now to have them taken away, though as long as the war lasts the sacrifice must go on. He hoped that soon the whole nation would come to the help of those at the front and that this sad task of writing these notes of sorrow at last would cease. In a further letter, young Paterson's commanding officer says he was all the more grieved at his death in as much as he was an excellent soldier, always light hearted, and of good courage. He was keen to do his duty and always kept his high spirit, even in the most trying conditions. Both the officers and men regret his loss most deeply. Paterson, who was only 19 years of age, was a bright and likeable youth very popular with his comrades. At the outbreak of war he was serving in India and proceeded to France early in the year. His father, who is an old Seaforth Highlander, is at present serving as a private in the Royal Scots, while an elder brother, Lance Corporal Paterson, also in the Seaforths, was recently wounded.

Obituary: James Porteous - Seaforth Highlanders

[DALKEITH ADVERTISER 25 October 1917]: The announcement that Sergeant James Porteous, Seaforth Highlanders, has made the supreme sacrifice in the great war has caused keen regret to his many friends in Dalkeith. The sad news was conveyed in a letter from his officer commanding to Inspector Robertson, in which the writer says - "It is with the deepest feelings of regret that I write to inform you of the death of Sergt. Porteous, who was killed in action on October 12th. With his usual courage and disregard for danger he was in the forefront of the attack and to the great dismay of all he advanced too far and was killed by our own artillery barrage. He had always said that no German would ever kill him, and he was right, but we can ill afford to lose him. It is very cruel luck that he should have met his fate at the hands of our own gunners, but it is a glorious death, showing as it does his great devotion to duty. Sergeant Porteous was one of the most popular N.C.O.'s no only in the Company, but in the Battalion, and whose loss we all deeply regret." As a reserve Sergeant Porteous was called up on the outbreak of the war, and fought at Mons, Marne and in other important engagements in the early days of the great conflict, during which the original Expeditionary Force played such gallant part. He had to bear his share of the troubles of the campaign having on different occasions been wounded, gassed, and suffered an attack of rheumatic fever. About four months ago he was awarded the Military Medal for the prominent part he took while leading his platoon, in capturing a position held by superior enemy forces and taking 33 prisoners. Sergeant Porteous was a boxer of considerable repute and since the outbreak of the present war he distinguished himself by winning the principal boxing honours in the army, including both the regimental and divisional championships. He was a fine specimen of the British soldier and was popularly known among his comrades as "Big Jim." Some years ago he served with his regiment in India

Obituary: Daniel Turner Pringle - Seaforth Highlanders

[DALKEITH ADVERTISER 12 August 1915]: Another Gorebridge lad has made the supreme sacrifice in the great war for the freedom of the world. This is Private Daniel Pringle, 9th Batt. Seaforth Highlanders, who died in No. 10 Stationary Hospital, St. Omer France, on August 3rd, from gunshot wounds in the head received in action two days previously. The first intimation of the sad and painful news was received by his parents, Mr and Mrs James Pringle, Waverley Cottage, through a telegram sent from the Record Office, Perth, and this was followed shortly after by the official letter containing the King and Queen's deepest sympathy. The brave lad, who was just 18 years of age, being the youngest of a family of nine, answered his country's call to arms within a month after the outbreak of hostilities, and sailed for the seat of war on May 1st, having transferred to the 7th Battalion of his distinguished regiment so as to get into the fighting earlier than he would otherwise have done. He played his part in trench warfare, and in all his letters home - the last was received two days before the intimation of his death - he showed an undaunted and cheerful spirit. In civil life he was, like his father, an employee of the Gala Water District Committee of the Mid-Lothian Council. Of a sprightly nature, "Dan" was a general favourite of all whom knew him, and that he was a typical "Tommy" was shown whilst on a short furlough home in the early part of this year, one of his ways of manifesting his ardour being by drilling chums or boys at every opportunity. Not one of the Waverley Cottage family are now at home with the old folks. Of the five sons, another two are serving King and Country, i.e., William, in the Royal Engineers, now in the thick of the fighting at the Dardanelles, and David in the Army Service Corps, whilst the eldest, Alex., is engaged in the oil-trade, and James is in U.S.A. Widespread sympathy goes out to the parents in their bereavement.

Obituary: Thomas Wyper - Seaforth Highlanders

[The Book of Remembrance for Tweeddale]: Tom Wyper was one of those brave country lads who enlisted at the very beginning of the war, in August, 1914. He joined the 8th Seaforth Highlanders. He was aged twenty-three. One letter only was received from him. In a letter received from the chaplain it was stated that he was killed instantaneously by the explosion of a shell. "The battalion has suffered severe casual—ties during the past week through more than usual bombardment of the trenches, and among several who fell was your son. His loss is more keenly felt because of his long association with the battalion, combined with his fine soldier-like qualities. He was among the bravest, and never flinched in the face of danger. Alas, I never see a young promising life like his cut short at the threshold of its promise without thinking of the greater and more lasting sorrow of those at home. May the remembrance of the Christian Hope help to sustain you in the dark hour. Our sympathy goes out to you in your irreparable loss of such a gallant son. There is so little one can say save the bare facts." Another son, Private William Wyper, Royal Scots Fusiliers, fell on April 10th, 1918. There was also another son who enlisted in September, 1914. He was in France and then in Salonika, and was in the fighting from start to finish; he had nothing worse than a slight wound, and won through in the end. Of Tom, there is no photograph to be had.



A gardener by profession, he served his apprenticeship at Oxenfoord Castle gardens, but previous to enlistment in the 'Sherwoods' he was employed as a gardener in County Sussex. He formerly belonged to the 8th Royal Scots.



Obituary: William James Patterson - South Wales Borderers

[Midlothian Journal 13 December 1918]: Company-Sergt.-Major William James Patterson, 1st Royal Scots, transferred to 7th South Wales Borderers, who was first reported wounded and missing, and later reported killed in action on 18th September, was a soldier of sixteen year's service, part of his time being spent in India, where he won a large number of valuable trophies for marksmanship with the service rifle. After being stationed at Glencorse for a period as a cook, and much against his will being retained for home service, he was at last allowed to proceed to the front, and was attached to the South Wales Borderers, his great regret being that he had severed from his old regiment. Apart from the Government intimation Mrs Patterson has received practically no details of her husband's death beyond a letter from an officer stating the place of burial and the number of the grave. The deceased, who was 34 years of age, was a native of Norwich. He leaves a widow and four young children, who reside at 2 Imrie Place.





Obituary: John Grierson - The King's (Liverpool Regiment)

[The Book of Remembrance for Tweeddale: Books IV. and V: Landward Parishes]: Sec. Lieut. John Grierson was killed instantaneously while leading his platoon on the 21st March, 1918, at Henin, being with the 13th King's Liverpool Regiment. He was mobilised with the Innerleithen company of the 8th R.S., and went to France with them in November, 1914, being C.Q.M.S. of B Coy., 8th R.S. He was wounded on the 4th July, 1916, and came to England to Catterick Camp. He spent four months in Bath with the O.T.C., and was gazetted 2nd Lieutenant in the 3rd King's Liverpool Regiment in October, 1917, and was stationed at Cork till 1st March. He left for France on the 6th March, and went up the line to join his Battalion on the 13th. In one letter he tells us his company "is in a support trench, which was very clean and dry." In a letter written on the 20th March, 1918, he says: "To-day and yesterday it is raining a lot, and the trenches are very muddy and sticky. I am wet through wading up and down from 4 a.m. till 8 o'clock where my platoon was working, covered from head to feet in mud. I quite enjoyed myself, and it was good fun. Of course, the men swore a bit, but they are real good fellows in my company. The battalion has been in the trenches for a long time, and may go into rest billets within the next fortnight. I am going out to work in the evening again, making advanced trenches." At the outbreak of war he was employed in Waverley Mill, Innerleithen. His brother was Sec. Lieut. Charles P. Grierson (wounded).

Obituary: Walter Hume - The King's (Liverpool Regiment)

[Dalkeith Advertiser 3 January 1918]: The official intimation received on Saturday that Corporal Walter Hume, of the Liverpool Scottish, had been killed in action on the 30th November, has occasioned deep regret among his many friends in Dalkeith. The third son of Mr and Mrs James Hume, South street, he enlisted two days after the proclamation of war and participated in much of the arduous fighting in the early days of the campaign. He was eventually wounded and invalided home, but had been back in France for about five months when he met his death. He was extremely popular with his comrades in the army, and his commanding officer speaks in high terms of his devotion to duty and of his personal worth. Referring to Corporal Hume, 2nd Lieut. B P Gallop, in a letter to the deceased's parents, says:- 'One of the original members of the battalion who came to France in 1914, he has done his duty consistently always. Since he has been with my platoon, he has been most reliable, and had the confidence of both myself and the men under him. Before he was killed he put up a most gallant fight, without the slightest regard to his own personal safety.' Before the war Corporal Hume carried on a hairdresser's business in Dalkeith. His eldest brother, Sergeant Robert Hume, has been serving for nearly two years in German East Africa, and his youngest brother, Private Aitken Hume, is at present in Bangour Hospital suffering from wounds received in action.

Obituary: Thomas Donald Muir - The King's (Liverpool Regiment)

[Dalkeith Advertiser 3 October 1918]: The sad intelligence has reached Mr and Mrs Peter Muir, Store Buildings, that their son, Corporal Thomas D. Muir, King's Liverpool Regiment, has laid down his life on the field of battle. A letter from an officer to the deceased's parents says: "The other officers and all the men would like to join with me in saying how much we appreciate Tommy and how sincerely we sympathise with you and his other relatives and friends. I have only been with the Battalion a few weeks, and during that time he has acted as my platoon Sergeant. During that time I had ample opportunity of realising his loyal assistance in everything, and his thoughtfulness in looking after the men. Another officer had taken a tour of duty for me in the front line, and your son was accompanying him in his rounds when a shell burst on the parapet, and instantaneously killed both by severe head wounds. I fear it is but cold comfort to tell you he died painlessly and doing his duty. Hardened though we are to death of our friends, all of us are shocked at his sudden leaving of us, for somehow I had found him so likeable." Another officer, who writes that Corporal Muir was killed on the morning of September 15th, adds that he was an excellent soldier, brave at all times always cheery, had working and uncomplaining, and popular with officers and men alike. Corporal Muir enlisted in the Royal Engineers in November 1916, and went to France in September 1917, being transferred to the King's Liverpool Regiment. In civil life he was a joiner, having served his apprenticeship with Mr James Sinclair, Dalkeith. A lad of bright and amiable disposition, his death will be regretted by all who knew him. This is the second bereavement Mr and Mrs Muir have sustained through the war, their eldest son, Robert, Royal Scots, being killed in May 1915.
