Onboard are a variety of visual promotions and plenty of information on waste reduction and recycling within both the home and school environments.



Helping you recycle more ... at school

Education and awareness activities are at the heart of driving a change of attitude toward waste.

Incorporating the reduce, reuse, recycle message within lessons is key to encouraging young people to think differently about waste, and to think about how they can incorporate waste minimisation activities into their own school and home environments.

Midlothian Council offers a comprehensive programme of waste education which links into the Curriculum for Excellence through Sustainable Development Education and the Eco-Schools Program.

We have several new and exciting waste activities to offer and hope that continued collaboration with local schools will improve pupil's understanding of waste and recycling and that the lessons learnt will be passed on and become part of everyday life.





The story of 'King Wastealot and the Mountain of Rubbish' (waste & recycling)

The story of 'King Wastealot's Picnic' (litter & recycling)

Description: These two stories feature a King who does not recycle, and tell what happens to his kingdom. It can be shown on a smart board as slides or as A3 laminated pictures which are held up in front of a small group whilst the story unfolds.

Message: What can be done at home and in school to recycle waste

Curriculum strands: Language, Sciences, Social Studies, Technologies

Age suitability: Nursery aged 3-5 and P1-P2

No of participants: 5 – 25 children Activity duration: 20 – 30 minutes

Room requirements: Classroom with area to seat all pupils comfortably on the floor

Other information: Please state if there is a

smart board available.

"Introduces waste and recycling to a young age group."

DVD – refuse collectors and recyclers

Description: Educational film looking at recycling and waste collections. It highlights a typical family situation and demonstrates how children can become involved in recycling activities within the home.

Message: How and why we should recycle our waste

Curriculum strands: Language, Health and Wellbeing, Sciences, Social Studies, Technologies

Age suitability: P1-P4

No of participants: 12 – 25 children

Activity duration: 30 minutes plus discussion time. Can lead in to classroom activities i.e.

sorting, poster making and tasking.

Room requirements: Classroom /area with room to allow children to view screen

Other information: TV or other viewing equipment is required to be provided.



Rubbish Challenge

Description: Large floor based game for the whole class or smaller groups played in teams. The game is set out on the floor and played in a similar way to monopoly with die being thrown and markers (pupils) being moved around the board where challenges are given out along the way. Pupils need wits and imagination to win!

Message: The concepts of reduce, reuse and recycle can be applied to everyday life

Curriculum strands: Language, Health and Wellbeing, Sciences, Mathematics, Health & Wellbeing, Social Studies, Technologies

Age suitability: P5 upwards

No of participants: 12 – 20 children

Activity duration: 45 minutes

Room requirements: Gym or dining hall

Rubbish Circle Game

Description: Pupils are arranged in a circle and are each presented with an item from a bag of waste (clean objects). Working in pairs, pupils have to decide how waste materials can be reduced, reused or recycled.

Message: Many waste items can be reused, and smart purchasing decisions can reduce household waste

Curriculum strands: Language, Health and Wellbeing, Sciences, Mathematics, Social Studies, Technologies

Age suitability: P4-P7

No of participants: 6 – 30 children Activity duration: 30 - 45 minutes

Room requirements: Classroom or area to seat all pupils in

circle either on chairs or comfortably on the floor



Description: Fun, active and intense. Similar to the 'Rubbish Circle Game' but more lively. Pupils work in teams to decide if various items can be reused or where they can be recycled at a mock up Household Waste Recycling Centre.

Message: We live in a 'throw away' culture, but there are alternative ways to deal with what some consider to be 'waste'

Curriculum strands: Language, Health and Wellbeing, Sciences, Mathematics, Health & Wellbeing, Social Studies, **Technologies**

Age suitability: P4 - P7

No of participants: 6 – 36 children

Activity duration: 60 minutes

Room requirements: Gym or dining hall





Wheel of Waste

Description: Pupils spin the wheel to select an item then tell their class how it can be reduced, reused or recycled.

Message: Many items can be reused before they are recycled

Curriculum strands: Language, Health and Wellbeing, Sciences, Mathematics, Health & Wellbeing, Social Studies, **Technologies**

Age Suitability: P4 upwards

No of participants: Small groups or whole class

Activity duration: Can be tailored to suit any time from 20

minutes up to 1 hour

Room requirements: Classroom with area to seat all pupils

comfortably on the floor

Bean Bag Game

Description: Pupils select a bean bag which corresponds to a waste item. They have to decide how to dispose of the item and then try their hand at throwing the bean bag through the correct hole in the display stand.

Message: Many common household items can be reduced, reuse or recycled

Curriculum strands: Language, Health and Wellbeing, Sciences, Mathematics, Health & Wellbeing, Social Studies, Technologies

Age Suitability: P4 upwards

No of participants: Small groups -up to 30 individual or

team game

Activity duration: Can be tailored to suit any time from 15

minutes up to 1 hour

Room requirements: Classroom or hall

Materials required: Smart Board or projector and screen,

extension lead.



Waste Audit

Description: A practical data collection and analysis often done by the Eco Committee or whole class. Children collect waste from within the school in advance of the activity. Mats are laid on the floor and the collected rubbish tipped out. Pupils then sort through and separate the waste into categories to weigh and record it.

Message: Some areas of the school create more waste than others, but steps can be taken to reduce or recycle waste created by the school

Curriculum strands: Language, Health and Wellbeing, Sciences, Mathematics, Health & Wellbeing, Social Studies, Technologies

Age Suitability: Eco Committee or P6-7 class

No of participants: Small group or whole class

Activity duration: Waste needs to be collected by pupils the previous week. Waste Analysis can take up to 2 hours

depending on amount of waste collected

Room requirements: Large hall

Materials required: Pencils, photocopies of record sheets, bags to collect the rubbish.

Other requirements: Planning meeting with Waste Aware Team necessary in advance.

This activity will count towards your Green Flag Award.

Zero Waste Lunch

Description: At the end of a lunch period, all the waste is collected in separate categories and weighed by the pupils. Children bringing a packed lunch to school are encouraged to consider how they can bring a waste free lunch in the future. The waste team return to repeat the activity to see if increased awareness has reduced the overall food waste and packaging composition.

Message: Many items of food waste or food packaging are avoidable and there is an environmental benefit in reducing food waste

Curriculum strands: Language, Health and Wellbeing, Sciences, Technologies, Mathematics, Health & Wellbeing, Social Studies

Age suitability: P1-P7

No. of participants: This is a whole school activity

Activity duration: 30 minute pre-activity information session and two lunch periods

Room requirements: Assembly hall with facilities to project an interactive presentation to the whole school

Materials required: Smart Board or projector and screen, extension lead.

Rag bag textile recycling

Raise funds for your school by recycling clothes, shoes and accessories.

The scheme is completely FREE and your school will be paid for every kg of clothes recycled.



Green Santa

Green Santa promotes the message of reuse.

In the run up to Christmas he collects unwanted toys from pupils and donates these to local charity shops where they

can be enjoyed by another child.

Green Santa collects toys, dolls, teddy bears, board games, PS or Xbox type games, children's books, jigsaws, and unwanted Christmas decorations.
