

- **Coal** was mined in Loanhead from the 16th century until the closure of **Bliston Glen Colliery** in 1989.
- **Dryden, Burghlee, Ramsay** (formerly **Loanhead**) and **Bliston Glen** were all collieries providing local employment.
- **Shale mining** and its associated works at **Straition** was a major employer of labour in the area, with the numbers and origins of the workforce having a significant impact on the development of Loanhead.
- **Loanhead Foundry** is known to have operated for over 150 years from the 18C, producing machinery for local businesses.
- **Paper making** was a significant source of local employment over many decades at the **Springfield, Polton** and **Kevock** mills.
- **Loanhead Railway Station** opened in 1874 enabling the carrying of coal, goods and people. The passenger service was withdrawn in 1933, with the last coal train running in 1991.
