Identified major and persistent inequalities in the areas of education, health, justice, participation, work and living standards.
Attainment gap data by local authority: FOI release, 2023	Shows significant attainment gaps in both Scotland and Midlothian between pupils from the most deprived and least deprived areas – at multiple stages of learning.
Scottish Household Survey, 2022	Shows disparities in access to internet, digital skills, communication barriers affecting multiple groups – older people, disabled people, people with sensory impairments, people from deprived areas.
Midlothian Housing and Homelessness Data, 2023	Homelessness remains a major issue nationally and locally. In 2022, there were 1,000 homeless households in the Council area, mainly living in temporary accommodation.

Consultation and Engagement

18. How has the proposal been informed by consultation and engagement?

As in previous years, overarching draft outcomes were developed jointly with Midlothian Health and Social Care Partnership and Integrated Joint Board, NHS Lothian, East and West Lothian Councils and their respective health and social care partnerships.

The pan-Lothian public consultation on draft equality outcomes ran from 21 November 2024 to 31 January 2025. The full online survey and a simplified accessible version were available on the Midlothian Council website. Paper copies were distributed to libraries and leisure centres. A BSL video was recorded to ensure that British Sign Language users could have their say.

Respondents were asked for their views on the key themes of: Education, Work, Living Standards, Health, Participation and Justice. A total of 221 responses were received from individuals and organisations across the Lothians region.

The majority of respondents agreed that the equality issues identified were important to address. However, many said that more specific and measurable actions were required to make our aims a reality.

Midlothian Council's outcomes were then refined and finalised with the agreement of the Council services tasked with delivering the associated actions.
